8 December: feast of the Immaculate Conception... Mary looks forward to the birth of her Son Jesus.. She is the "Beautiful Tabernacle of God".



"My God, you received Abel's offering.....likewise receive Jesus' Offering. As soon as he came into the world he offered his life to you as the first expression of all that was good in this world.


Receive his Offering again as you favourably received Abraham's made perfect by faith and obedience! But here, there is much more faith, trust, and perfect obedience.

310 years.. November 30 It is always good to celebrate a birth! November 30th 1715 marks the "birthfoundation" of our Congregation in Boucieu le Roi, France. We express a

deep and joyful gratitude to the seven women guided by Fr. Vigne in their

desire to offer their lives totally to the Lord whom they loved and adored, and to instruct the girls in the villages where they quickly established new communities.

The bishops greatly appreciated their mission as adorers and educators and frequently



requested Fr. Vigne to send sisters to their dioceses. They knew that these women were close to the "good people of the countryside" and that for them "working to instruct others was genuine practical charity", as Peter Vigne frequently told them.

That corresponds exactly to what Pope Leo XIV mentions in his apostolic Exhortation **Dilexi te.** No 71, signed on October 4th this year.

"Many female congregations.....founded in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, stepped into the spaces where the state was absent. They created schools in small villages, suburbs and working-class neighbourhoods. In particular, the education of girls became a priority. The religious sisters taught literacy, evangelized, took care of practical matters of daily life, elevated their spirits through the

cultivation of the arts, and, above all, formed consciences. Their pedagogy was simple: closeness, patience and gentleness. They taught by the example of their lives before teaching with words. In times of widespread illiteracy and systemic exclusion, these consecrated women were beacons of hope. Their mission was to form hearts, teach people to think and promote dignity. By combining a life of piety and dedication to others, they

fought abandonment with the tenderness of those who educate in the name of Christ".

Give thanks to the Lord with us on November 30th and ask the Lord that many vocations will spring up and flower, like those of our Founding Sisters who were adorers, educators, nurses, ..etc, close to those who needed them wherever their communities were established.
